



MINE FATALITY – On March 4, 2022, a 37 year-old bulldozer operator died when the bulldozer he was operating went over the edge of the highwall, landing upside down on the pit floor.



Best Practices

- Dump loads a safe distance back from the edge of the highwall and push the material over.
- Maintain control of mobile equipment while it is in operation.
- Perform ground condition and workplace examinations.
- Train miners to safely perform tasks.

This is the tenth fatality reported in 2022, and the third classified as "Machinery."

DEFENSIVE DRIVING—ACCIDENT PREVENTION

The formula for defensive driving is to see the hazard, understand the defense and act in time.

Why is Defensive Driving Important? Understanding and effectively applying this formula prevents accidents in spite of the actions of other drivers or the presence of adverse driving conditions. A good defensive driver must be able to anticipate the outcome of traffic situations so that he or she can act in time to prevent an accident. Let's take a closer look at the standard accident prevention formula and how it can be applied to everyday driving situations. See the Hazard

Constantly scan the road ahead of you and check your mirrors. Think about what may happen as far in advance as possible. Never assume that a hazardous condition will have passed before you reach it. Consider the following

Scenarios:

- You see an approaching vehicle starting to pass another car. It looks like they will complete the pass in plenty of time, but you are not really sure. Think about your defense.
- You see a vehicle on the shoulder of the road-you can't see the driver anywhere outside the vehicle. What if the door of the vehicle is opened as you pass the vehicle? What would you do?
- You are traveling along a residential street. The vehicle approaching is a convertible with its top down. On the same side of the street you see a lawn sprinkler that is spraying water onto the roadway. What do you think the approaching vehicle will do and how would you react?

Of course, there are countless more possi-

bly dangerous scenarios, so look beyond the bumper of the vehicle in front of you and stay alert for any situation that could potentially develop into an accident. *Understand the Defense*

There are specific ways to handle most hazardous situations on the road. When you anticipate a hazard, you are able to review the situation in your mind and visualize your defense so that when the time comes, you are able to act quickly enough to prevent an accident. Preparation is the key. If you have planned for various scenarios, you will feel comfortable when faced with them.

In an emergency situation, do not panic. Stay calm and continue to visualize the defensive action you will take to minimize damage.

Act in Time

Once you see the hazard and decide upon a defense, act immediately. Never assume that condition will clear up. The sooner you act the more time you will have to avoid an accident.

Defensive driving is not easy. You must constantly strive to improve your observation and coordination skills by scanning the road and concentrating on potentially hazardous situations. Seeing the hazrd, knowing the defense and acting in time can mean saving lives; yours and those of the drivers around you.

Safety Matters

Learn From Near Accidents

When you're driving the speed limit down the highway and another car pulls out in front of you, it's necessary to hit the brakes or execute a quick maneuver to avoid an accident. Chances are you'll make a mental note to be more alert from that point on.

Close calls or near accidents on the job should also be considered lessons in safety. A near accident is an indication that something is wrong. It's a warning that a machine isn't operating correctly, materials aren't stacked properly, or someone has done something unsafe.

Warning Signs

If you notice a warning light on the dashboard of your vehicle, you know immediately not to ignore it. Unfortunately, unsafe actions on the job aren't always as easily detected.

Below are some typical accidents that could have been avoided if their "warnings" had not been ignored.

- A shop employee stumbles over a two-by-four lying on the ground, fracturing an ankle
- An office worker slips on spilled water and grabs a metal file cabinet, which falls on him/ her
- A machine operator is injured when a hi-lo strikes the machine being operated

The proper handling of near accidents could have prevented the real thing from happening in the cases mentioned above. The two-by-four and spill probably caused other employees to step aside to avoid slipping. Yet, nobody bothered to clean up the item or report it to a supervisor. And how many near misses did the hi-lo operator have with the machine? Chances are there were several. However, in all of these cases, nothing was done to correct the situation, resulting in an accident.

Keep Safety in Mind

Unfortunately, a near accident is often forgotten without any benefits resulting from the experience. For example, if you have wounded yourself at work in the past, you may have a scar – a visible reminder of the injury to tell you not to repeat the action that caused the wound. However, nearaccidents are often dismissed as lucky breaks.

How can you turn a close call into a contribution to safety? Below are two ways that you may already be using.

- Be safety-minded; voice your concern over near-accidents.
- Correct any dangerous situation and remove the hazard that caused the near-accident. If you can't handle it routinely, then report it to your supervisor.

Safety awareness is always important. It's a case of preparing yourself mentally to act in a safe manner and to recognize a close call as a warning. So, when a stack of books tips over or the handle on a tool snaps, pay attention to the warning and do something about it.





EDITORIAL

The main argument given by contractors against joining a contractors organization is "What has it done for me?" In the first place I feel that this is the wrong approach to joining any organization. A better question would be "What will it do for me WITH MY HELP?" But, since the first question is the one most often asked let me answer it for you.

First, your State Association (and it's yours whether you are a member or not because it represents the complete industry) has cooperated with State USDA Agencies in developing both costshare rates and specifications in the ACP handbook.

Second, your National Association has sent well qualified representatives to Washington D. C. to appear before the House Agricultural Appropriations Committee for the past two years. The Bureau of the Budget has recommended a decrease of \$100 million in these appropriations both years. Last year we were successful in getting this proposed reduction thrown out. We believe that the same can be accomplished this year (see report on page 7). A reduction in these appropriations would have severe ill effects on most conservation contractors.

Third, your States and the National Association have all taken a stand opposing the Federal-Use Tax presently being levied on conservation contractors Trucks and Truck-Tractors on the same basis as on commercial carriers (see report page 15). This tax we believe is very unfair but we need strength to fight this issue.

Fourth, your State and District Association, through regular meetings, State Conventions and

RECIPE

<u>Chicken Marinara</u>

6 Tbsp. Canola oil

4 Large boneless chicken breasts

1 sleeve saltine crackers, finely crushed

1 C. flour

1/2 C. Parmesan cheese

4 Slices of Provolone Cheese

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. pepper

2 eggs

3 cups milk, divided in half

24 ounces marinara sauce

Heat oven to 375°

Combine crackers, flour, parmesan cheese, salt and pepper in shallow bowl. Whisk eggs and 1 1/2 cups milk in a 2nd shallow bowl.

Heat Canola oil in a large heavy skillet (I use cast iron)

Dip chicken breasts first in egg mixture, then in cracker mixture. Repeat steps, then place chicken in the skillet. Brown chicken until slightly brown on both sides.

Prepare a 9" x 13" baking pan with cooking spray. Whisk together remaining 1 1/2 cups milk and marinara sauce. Pour mixture into dish.

Place browned chicken breasts on top of marinara sauce. Top each chicken breast with one slice of cheese.

Cover dish with foil and bake for 40 minutes.

Uncover dish and return to oven for 5-10 minutes or until cheese begins to brown.




